shop the 90 percent off sales for items that can be turned into something new for year-round use or Christmas. After Valentine's Day, Burner purchased Styrofoam hearts to upcycle into a something not at all related to the holiday. She will also scour Dollar Tree stores for inexpensive supplies.

"We recycle a lot, and we wouldn't be able to do this if we didn't," said Burner.

The church will also trade items with Cathy Raines, founder of Upsy Daisy Creative Reuse Center, which is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit.

"We get stuff from her and she gets stuff from us," said Burner.

"It's a good partnership," said Nancy Wilburn, a church volunteer.

Church volunteers will take different supplies and make a completely unique object for the bazaar. The church has several supply closets and whole rooms dedicated to making items for the bazaar.

"It's everywhere," said Burner. "Everywhere where there's an empty space."

Even in the middle of the summer, volunteers will be found making Christmas decorations and ornaments since those are among some of the best-selling items in November.

"Carved Santas were very popular," said Wilburn about last year's bazaar.

The bazaar is organized in different rooms based on type of item, such as yarn, woodworking, Christmas, quilts and vintage.

"We have an art gallery with paintings," said Wilburn.

The night before the bazaar, the church will hold a "Mistletoe and Munchies" ticketed dinner where customers can look through the rooms and plan what they would like to buy. The next day, they come back to pur-


chase the items. Some buyers even make a map of the rooms so they can go back for exactly what they want the next day.

"We open at nine, but we usually have a line," said Burner. Bethany United Church has had customers arrive as early as 7:30 the morning of the bazaar, which runs from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m.

The bazaar also has a silent auction component. This year, one featured silent auction item will be a restored dollhouse.

Baked goods can also be purchased at the bazaar, all made by the women of the church.

Upsy Daisy celebrates one year of upscaling treasures

"Don't throw that away! Give it to Upsy Daisy." Upsy Daisy Creative Reuse Center, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit located at 3261 George Washington Memorial Highway in Hayes associated with Bethany United Methodist Church, marked one year in business early last month. Since opening, the low-cost

arts and crafts supply store has saved 11,027 pounds of recyclable material from the landfill.

Many of founder Cathy Raines's customers encourage others to donate their unwanted items to the store to be reused in upcycling projects—the process of making old items into something new.

"We find a place for pretty much anything," said Raines.

"We don't trash very much," said Upsy Daisy volunteer Nancy Dyson.

The store has so many items that it has filled every room to the brim, packed away holiday-themed items

in the basement and stored any extra items that do not yet have a place inside the shop's shed.

"We're constantly reorganizing," said Raines.

Upsy Daisy helps with the Jubilee of Churches, which will assist recently homeless individuals furnish their new living spaces. The group needed a tall dresser that would fit in a limited floor plan and Raines was able to donate one she had in storage. The store was also able to donate a television to Knott Alone-Hold Fast, a support group for veterans. Helping the Homeless Thrift store will give Upsy Daisy



"We've got an ambitious schedule for the summer."

Charles Records, construction/project coordinator for Gloucester County Public Schools, is looking forward to a number of accomplishments in the ongoing renovation at Gloucester High School. Tasks ahead include renovating the media center (library), commons, extended learning area, kitchen and dining area, auxiliary gym and band, drama and choral rooms all this summer.

The boys' locker room was recently completed and the demolition of the girls' locker room is underway. 'D' hall is nearing completion and will be finished by June 6, allowing for those classes in the modular classrooms to be moved back to their original location.

"We're still under budget," said Records. Construction delivery is also coming in ahead of schedule.

Site plan work for the exterior of GHS is also planned for this summer. This includes creating a dedicated bus loop, restructuring the student parking lot and widening the field hockey field.

"This summer is undoubtedly the trickiest part of the project," said Records.





Ware Academy expansion project begins

Ware Academy held a groundbreaking ceremony for its expansion project Monday. The project is scheduled to be completed by Dec. 15 of this year.

"It's a pretty extensive project," said Head of School Dawn Fleet.

Ware is adding 5,000 square feet, which includes three additional classrooms and a new technology lab. The current technology lab is housed in the historic building.

"The rooms will be a lot bigger than they are now," said Fleet.

The new classrooms will be used for third, fourth and fifth grade students and will give them more room to move around. According to Fleet, Ware is "busting at the seams."

This will also give more room for Ware to work with if the decision is made to expand its enrollment.

"We are at capacity at this point, so we have to do something," said Fleet.

Also, part of the expansion project, an outdoor classroom will be built. A new pond will also be onsite for WATER PRO Great Water, Great Life.

students to take part in experiential learning at their own school, instead of having to travel offsite for these lessons. The students will be able to watch tadpoles grow and learn how to take water samples. Wildlife, like frogs and birds, will also be present for students to observe.

Ware is also going to build a real parking lot and adding two new turn lanes on Route 14 right in front of the school to make parent pickup and drop-off of students easier. A new practice baseball/softball field will also be added.

As far as student enrollment goes, Fleet said Ware has increased from 130 students to 197 over the last five years.

"It's a jump for us," said Fleet. "We're at a real pivotal point."

Fleet said "keeping Ware what it is" is important to her, as well as maintaining small class sizes. "We don't want to go too big," she said.

So far, Ware has raised more than \$2.5 million of the




\$3 million needed to complete the project. The public phase of the project's fundraising has just begun.

A look at the plans for the new east classroom and site improvements.


